Unlike most coffees, our beans are carefully roasted in a small batch roaster. Without the benefit of gauges, gadgets and high technology, our beans require constant attention, both visually and aromatically in order to ensure the correct roast for each batch. In the large, more convenient roasters, coffee beans often receive a tinge as they are crushed by weight against the walls of the roaster, which produces a tart burnt flavor. Our antique Royal #5 is an exact replica of the 1890 version and its small 25 pound capacity returns to the days when a less hurried pace produced a higher quality product. We like to think of this as "Romancing The Bean", a technique of days gone by, reproduced for your enjoyment.

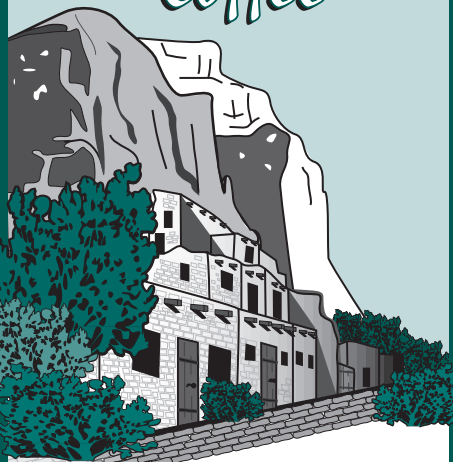

## Taos Facts

Between 800 to 1,000 years ago, long before there was a Town of Taos, New Mexico, this area was the home of the Tiwa Indians.

The Taos Pueblo, thought to be the oldest continuously inhabited structure in the United States, evolved into a trading center by the 13th Century.

On August 29, 1540, members of the Coronado wandering expedition, a group of Spanish soldiers led by Captain Hernando de Alvarado, made their way from the Tigua villages in the Rio Grande valley - near the current day area of San Juan - and came into the valley which we call Taos. They were the first explorers to see the pueblo buildings built by the Tiwa Indians. When Hernando de Alvarado saw the sun shinning on the straw built adobes at the Taos Pueblo he thought that he had discovered the famed Cities of Gold.
